A Permanent Supportive Housing Program

Serving Chronically Homeless Individuals and Families in New Bedford, Massachusetts



What can I expect if I participate in the program?

Welcome Home provides 15 units of scatteredsite apartment housing to persons with an HIV/AIDS diagnosis who are chronically homeless in the City of New Bedford.

Participants may remain in Welcome Home apartments permanently with the goal to transition into independent living as they develop the necessary skills and support systems to be self-sufficient in the community. Supportive services are available to residents.

Services include assistance with connecting to behavioral health treatment and obtaining employment, entitlements, and parenting, living and coping skills, as well as finding independent housing prior to discharge.

These skills, services, and supports empower participants so they experience housing stability and an improved quality of life.

Who is eligible?

Eligible participants must have an HIV/AIDS diagnosis, be 18 years of age or older and chronically homeless in New Bedford, medically and psychologically stable and willing to authorize a CORI check.

How do I apply?

Self-referrals are accepted, as well as referrals from social service agencies, addiction centers, and other providers. To receive an initial screening, please call 508-984-7514. If you meet the program criteria, an intake assessment will be conducted on site. Upon acceptance, you will be placed on a waiting list and required to contact the program weekly to express your continued interest in the program.

Welcome Home is funded by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) under the City of New Bedford Continuum of Care.
